## SUCCESS IN PHILLY - JERRY ELLISON

Arlington's **U17G Storm** and **U10G Sparks** won big during the 4th Annual Liberty Belles Soccer Tournament over the Columbus Day weekend, extending the Sparks' tournament winning streak to three since last Columbus Day.

Winning their first match by forfeit, Storm's **Carin Usrey** scored 28 seconds into their second game — one of two that led to a 2-1 victory. Sunday began with a 0-2 defeat by a local U-18 team. But the two met again an hour later to settle the championship.

In a "tweaked" formation with a lineup to better match against their bigger and more physical opponents, **Anna Raven-Hansen's** move from center

mid-field to sweeper seemed to unhinge the other team in the first half; score 0-0. Fifteen minutes into the second half, **Hanna Byrd** put the Storm on the board. Ten minutes later, it was tied again. Then with 3 minutes remaining, **Byrd** scored again, sealing a 2-1 victory.

Sparks' first day ended in a win

(4-0) and tie with two shutouts in goal by **Emma Wolfarth** and **Mary Karangelen**. Day Two brought a loss (0-1) and a tie (2-2), but enough for the Sparks to advance to play Warminster's Hurricanes for the championship. This was the

REFEREE FOR FUN & PROFIT -PAUL SMITH



Anyone over 12 can have a good time and earn decent pocket money as a soccer referee. Training is required and there are opportunities coming soon.

Two levels of training are available. One is a two-night course that qualifies graduates to referee ASA "house" or recreational games. The other is a 16-hour commitment that results in USSF certification as a "Grade

8" (or entry-level) ref. USSF certification is required to officiate at "travel" or select games in local leagues and at tournaments. Those between 12 and 16 can serve as an Assistant Referee (linesman) for travel matches; if 13 or over you can be center referee for ASA games.

House games pay \$10 for ASA refs and \$12 for USSF. Travel leagues pay from \$15

to \$35 depending on position and team "age." Games are usually assigned two at a time.

Dr. Harvey Snyder (703-534-8697) usually holds an ASA course prior to the spring season and offers one for USSF in Arlington in January. Advance registration and notice is required for both. There's more information at [www.arlingtonsoccer.com](http://www.arlingtonsoccer.com).

## NEED IDEAS FOR TEAM FUNDRAISING?

Every team needs to raise money. Here are a few tried-and-true ideas.

**Yard Sale** Done as a team, this practically guarantees \$1000 to \$1800 if it's on a high-traffic street, multi-family, advertised as such in *The Washington Post*, and yard signs point the way from nearby streets. Items should be priced beforehand, lots of change should be available,

and a banner announcing the team's name (with the team there in uniform) will keep things moving smoothly.

**Car Wash** Good for older teams. The kids do the work, but require parental supervision. Reserve a date well in advance at a service station or location with hose hook-ups. As with real estate, the key is location, location, location.

**Grocery Coupons** Safeway, Giant, and Shoppers Food Warehouse have gift certificate and gift card programs for non-profit organizations. Your team buys, say, \$1000 worth of coupons for \$950, sells them, and pockets \$50. The revenue can go into a team account for uniforms or scholarships, or can credit the selling family for half to defray their seasonal bill.

ATSC will split the proceeds (50-50) from any advertising in this newsletter sold by a team member or parent. Ad rates run \$175 (full-page), \$100 (half-page), \$60 (quarter-page), and \$35 (business card). ## EXECUTIVE BOARD REQUIRES PLAYER EVALUATIONS

On a unanimous vote, the ATSC Executive Board decided to require all coaches provide players with a written evaluation after the fall season and midway through the spring. Coaches can supplement their evaluation verbally, if they choose.

The fall post-season evaluation is intended to inform the

players of their strengths and suggest areas to work on or improve over the winter.

The mid-season, spring evaluation is aimed, in part, at notifying players they may be at risk of not retaining a spot on the team unless they are able to improve in specific areas. While this may sound negative, it is intended

to provide positive information alongside suggestions for improvement.

## IS ATSC TOO BIG? • TOM NEWMAN, LUCY JENNINGS, CELESTE SZEWCZYK, MARTA CAHILL

ATSC currently fields 43 teams — 22 boy and 21 girl. To support these teams, we require practice space, game fields, qualified coaches, and referees for home games. All of these are in varying degrees of short supply. The ATSC Executive Board in October discussed limiting the number ATSC teams per age group as a way of dealing with our limited resources. Discussion focused on several issues. We present our rationale below.

**FIELDS** As we all know, new fields are not growing in Arlington. The shortage is particularly acute in the spring when baseball and lacrosse claim many fields. Every season, travel soccer is criticized by some of the recreational club managers because we take too many of “their” practice fields. (Travel teams get two 90 minute practices per week, house teams get one or two 45-60 minute practices.) While we had a pretty decent selection of game fields this fall, spring will again bring shortages.

**REFEREES** The shortage is not limited to Arlington; it is a regional, if not national, problem. One can argue that too few training classes are offered, or that referees are not paid enough. The most commonly discussed reason for the shortage is job dissatisfaction — that is, referee abuse (both verbal and physi-

cal) by coaches, players, and parents. In spite of many referees walking away from the job, many good ones remain and work as many games as they can in the interest of the players and the game. But many games remain uncovered on Sundays due to sheer quantity.

**COACHES** Arlington is fortunate to have many qualified and dedicated coaches teaching our children the skills and the game they need to be successful at soccer. The community coaching pool is not, however, without limits. We need to make Arlington an attractive club for our current and new coaches, and we need to be sure we can place qualified coaches with each of our teams.

In a number of age/sex groups, ATSC fields three teams. In two girls age groups, there are four.

The reason for forming third and fourth teams is to provide solid coaching, an opportunity for these players to compete at a higher level, and a chance to develop players who may subsequently compete on and strengthen the higher division teams in that sex/age group.

While this has worked fairly well over the past few years, at some point these third and fourth teams struggle to recruit enough players to stay

viable, and movement between the teams decreases.

Additionally, such teams often slide into a “club” type of mentality where players feel comfortable and “guaranteed” a spot, and want to stay together instead of encouraging player movement. This comfort level can further undermine ATSC goals by allowing the level of commitment and training to be less than demanded by a competitive situation for player positions.

As a result of our discussions, we have agreed that we will not form any fourth teams in the future. Additionally, we will work with existing teams to reduce the number of teams in some age groups at the appropriate transition point. For example, there are times — such as when the U15 age group players enter high school — that normal attrition will reduce the number of players interested in continuing with travel soccer.

We plan to work with teams to ensure a smooth transition from four teams to three, or from three teams to two, during the tryout process. We also want to work with some of the teams to explore other options for soccer play, such as the Suburban Friendship League, which involves play against other nearby clubs at a higher level than recreational soccer, but with less intensity than travel soccer entails.

We’ve set targets for Fall 2002. There will be no change in the number of U-9 (2-2) or U-10 (3-2) boys’ and girls’ teams. In U-11 and U-12, the boys’ three will remain; girls’ three may drop to two. U-13’s three boys’ teams could be reduced to two. U-13’s girls’ four are targeted for three or two. U-14 Boy’s three could become two. U-14 girls’ four are targeted for three or two. U-15 boys’ two will remain; the girls’ three could drop to two. U-16+ boys’ and girls’ each have one; they could get two, each.

If age groups currently have more than the proposed number of teams, tryouts will take place after the Spring 2002 season by higher level teams to see if some players can fill openings. As is current policy, decisions on the number of teams formed at tryouts each Spring rest with the Director of Coaching, appropriate VP, and ATSC President with input from the coaches in the age group.

Reducing the number of teams will put us closer to working within our current resources and return us to our original Mission (1998) offering qualified youth “*the opportunity to acquire and develop superior soccer skills through a higher level of competition and from higher levels of coaching expertise.*” If we refocus on becoming a “smaller, but better” club we can better address our teams’ needs and build a recognized, strong club.

## NCSL BOARD CLARIFIES CHANGES, PROCEDURES

At their October 15 meeting, the NCSL Board further clarified the rule concerning **tie-breaker procedures** used to determine team standings.

The already agreed-upon criteria adopted at the previous meeting is 1. Head to Head 2. Most wins 3. Fewest goals allowed during the season 4. Fewest disciplinary points awarded during the season 5. Greatest differential between goals for and goals against, and 6. Coin toss by NCSL President. As for #4: *Any disciplinary suspension awarded by R&D will count as 10 points for a player and 15 points for a coach. Any parent fine awarded will be counted as 5 points per*

*\$100 of assessed fine.*

Concerning **mandatory meetings**, current policy is that each U-9 and U-10 team must send at least one representative to the August meeting. If no representative is in attendance, the team is removed from league play in the Fall.

The new policy is: *"If no representative is in attendance, the team will be fined \$250 and 85% of the team parents must attend a videotaped session within five days. If neither condition is met, the team will be removed from league play for the Fall. If the team ever wishes to re-enter the league (at any age), 85% of the parents from the team*

*must attend the August meeting.*

After much discussion, it was agreed that the new wording keeps the importance of the meeting intact, while offering both a penalty and an opportunity for the team to continue in league play in the event of unforeseen circumstances. Candidly, the option hardly seems practical; a better remedy is for teams to ask several parents to attend the meeting as reps.

Finally, *"R&D Committee may suspend teams, in addition to levying fines for significant misconduct. The maximum fine will be \$800."* Formerly the fine was tied to registration fees.

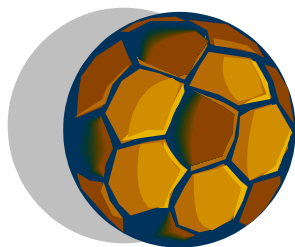
